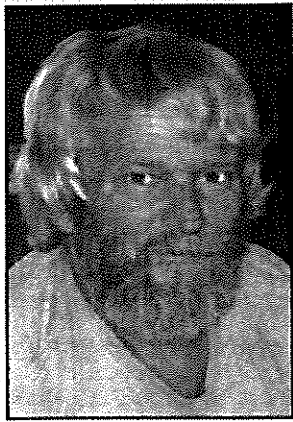


CHARLES PERRY HARTWIG
