

LIEUT. G. L. ROYCE DIES

Volunteer in the U. S. Army Passes
Away at His Home in
Malcom.

ENLISTED IN DECEMBER, 1917,
PRIVATE IN ORDNANCE DEPT.

Soldier Died While at Home on
a Furlough Only Tuesday
Morning.

Glaucius L. Royce was born on a farm near Malcom, Poweshiek county, Iowa, March 25, 1883, and has made Malcom his home all his life. He was a student in the Malcom high school and graduated in the class of 1909. Following this he entered the Dental College at the State University of Iowa, and pursued that course until he was forced by sickness to drop the work. He then became a contracting carpenter and builder, which work he

followed until the great war involved the United States in the struggle. He made voluntary enlistment into the army of the United States of America on December 10, 1917, as a private in the ordnance department. On February 1st, 1918, he was appointed sergeant in that department, as a mark of ability and confidence. He was commissioned second lieutenant in the ordnance department on August 10, 1918. He served in this capacity in the Chemical division until death in the form of Spanish influenza and pneumonia stopped his career on the morning of December 3rd, 1918, having been in the army just one week less than a year.

MALCOM LOSES TWO

Lieutenant G. L. Royce and Private Guy
Early Have Given Their Lives for
Their Country.

LIEUTENANT ROYCE DIES
WHILE VISITING HOME

Guy L. Early Killed in Action Nov. 4—Two
Special Notices from Malcom Today An-
nounce Death of Two Malcom Boys.

Lieutenant Glaucius L. Royce, a son of Lee Royce, of Malcom, Iowa, died here this morning of pneumonia.

This deceased was stationed at Cleveland, Ohio, and came home last week on a furlough.

Lieutenant Royce was 35 years of age, and leaves a wife and three small children.

A telegram has just been received that Guy B. Early, a son of Joseph L. Early, of Malcom, was killed in action on November 4th.

Guy was about 30 years of age, a fine young man. He left here last summer.

No particulars have been received.

During his period of service he was stationed at Rock Island, Ill., at Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Iowa, at Camp Hancock, Augusta, Georgia, and at Nela Park, Cleveland, Ohio. He came home on a furlough for Thanksgiving and was at home at the time of his death.

He was married on December 21, 1909, to Anna Louise Crull of Malcom. Three children, Lee A., Merle L., and Clair C., blessed this marriage, and remain to mourn with their mother the death of this estimable man. Other relatives left to mourn are his father, Leonidas Royce, of Malcom.

Lieut. Royce was a member of the Malcom lodge of I. O. O. F. for years.

His life was one of continuous hard work, always marked by sincerity, conscientiousness, and unquestioned integrity. Few people made more friends than he and none kept them better.

Besides his own family he leaves to mourn his loss his father, Lee Royce, and step-mother, Mrs. Lee Royce, his own mother having died when he was two years old; also two sisters, Mrs. Fred Vest of Craig, Colo., Mrs. Frank Vest of Malcom, one half-brother, W. B. Royce of Malcom, and Mrs. A. L. Magnuson and family of Malcom, and one step-brother, Forest Rector, of Malcom, besides many cousins and a host of friends.
