Walter R. Ostrom, 72, retired Air Force and Civil Servant, was a 31-year resident of Wichita Falls, passed away on February 18, 2006.

He returned to the states to Goodfellow AFB, San Angelo, Texas where he was an instructor in the Technical Instructor's course. He retired from the military in 1973.

Walter worked for Civil Service at Sheppard AFB, first as an instructor in the telephone inside plant; was promoted to GS-11 position in 1980 as a training manager, then promoted to GS-12 in 1983 as Chief of Training Development in Transportation Training. He retired from government service in 1993.

Walter was active as a volunteer in Adult Literacy teaching adult reading. He was a member of the downtown YMCA where he swam a mile everyday. He served as a member of the YMCA Advisory Committee. He also was a member of the Sheppard Rod and Gun Club holding three different club offices over the years along with shooting skeet and trap. Besides his love of skeet, he fished, hunted dove and deer, did wood-working in his shop, gardening, water skiing, had a loft full of pigeons and absolutely loved bird watching. A big football fan, he loved watching TV football, especially his favorite team the Dallas Cowboys.
