

**E. P. Day Died
Tuesday Noon;
Funeral Friday**

E. P. Day, longtime resident of Grinnell, died in a local hospital about noon on Tuesday. He was past 80 years of age. Funeral services will be held from the Smith Funeral Home at 7:30 o'clock Friday afternoon with interment in Hazelwood cemetery. Friends may call at the funeral home.

Mr. Day's son Eugene arrived from Chicago Wednesday evening. Mrs. Day died a number of years ago.

Funeral services for the late E. P. Day, conducted by Rev. Leland W. Mann, were held from the Smith Funeral Home Friday afternoon with interment in Hazelwood cemetery. Pall bearers were Ross Coultz, F. F. Clindin, Grinnell Dunham, Croft I'llgrim, Fred Ramsey, and D. H. Thomas.

Mr. Day would have been 82

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years old on his next birthday, having been born in Hollis, N. H., August 3, 1865. He was the son of Rev. and Mrs. Pliny Day. After the death of his father the widow with her three sons, Albert, Charles, and Edward, came to Iowa in 1878. As the family were friends of J. E. Grinnell they naturally located in Grinnell. Mrs. Day built the family home at the corner of Eighth avenue and Park street, where Mr. Day lived during all the remainder of his life.

In 1890 Mr. Day was united in marriage with Helen Norton and to this union was born one son, Eugene, now of Oak Park, Ill., the last surviving member of the family. Mrs. Day met her death in 1931 in an automobile accident in Des Plaines, Ill. Mrs. Day's sister, Mrs. Frederick W. Clough, died the following year and Mr. Clough and Mr. Day joined forces and have lived together in Grinnell in the Day homestead since that time.

A man of scholarly tastes, Mr. Day never engaged in business in Grinnell but lived quietly through the years watching the little settlement to which he came as a boy grow into the thriving city which it is today. He was a member of the Congregational church and until the weakness of his closing years came upon him was regular in his attendance at the church services. He was respected and esteemed by all who knew him.
