WILBUR CLYDE JANTZEN

Wilbur Clyde Jantzen, son of the late Fred and Katherine Jantzen, was born in Chester township Nov. 21, 1912, and departed his life, April 26, 1946 at the age of 33 years, 5 months and 5 days. He was reared in the Lutheran faith in infancy and attended Chester No. 6 school. After finishing school he was engaged in farming, in which he took much interest.

He entered the United States army in May, 1942 and served for 14 months.

On Sept. 29, 1944, he was united in marriage with Margaret Seidel and lived on a farm in Chester township until his death. He was very well liked by his friends and neighbors and by those who knew him.

He leaves to mourn, five sisters and two brothers, Leonard, Clifford and Hilda Jantzen, Esther Island, Edna Hayek, Stella Silhanek and Miriam Parnley. His parents preceded him in

death.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the James funeral home. The Rev. F. A. Moore was in charge. Pall bearers were John Allen, Jr., Louis Puls, Paul Erickson, Delmar Puls, Elmer Luttman and Clayton Dault.

Mrs. Roscoe Dempster and Mrs. John Carter sang two selections, "In The Garden" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere."

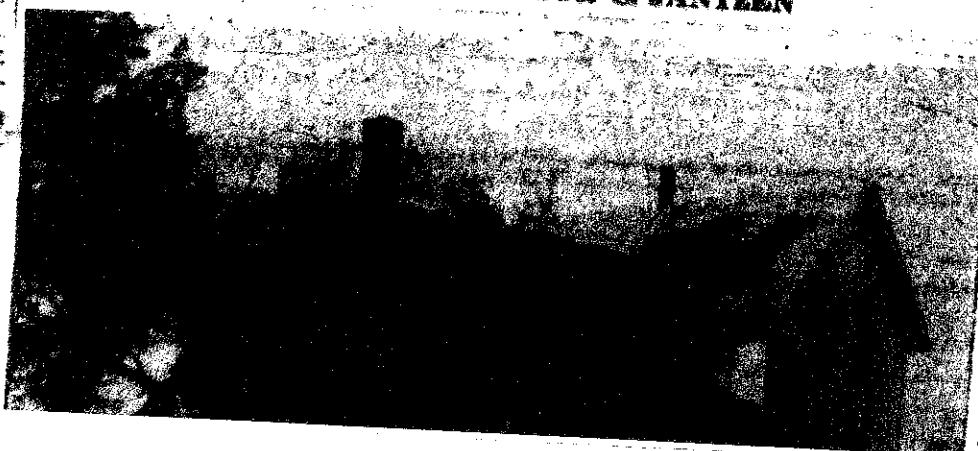
Burial was in Sheridan cemetery.

Poweshiek County Couple Killed In Double Shooting

Farm Couple Found By Her Sister

Rites Held Sunday For Wilbur Jantzen; Services Today For Mrs. Jantzen

Wilbur C. Jantzen, 32, Poweshiek county farmer and World war II veteran, Friday noon shot and killed his wife, age 33, with a shotgun and then turned the gun on himself in the kitchen of their farm home seven miles north of Grinnell in the Chester community.

Coroner W. B. Phillips viewed the bodies and pronounced the tragedy a case of murder and suicide. No inquest will be held. Mrs. Jantzen was shot through the right chest and Jantzen was shot through the heart, both wounds being made with a 12 gauge single barreled shot gun.

Her Sister Found Them

The murder and suicide was not discovered until about 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon by Mrs. Jantzen's sister, Mrs. Gerald Grosenback of near Grinnell. She had driven out to the Jantzen home to spend the afternoon, having been invited by Mrs. Jantzen that morning.

Details of what happened just prior to the shooting probably will never be known, since there were not witnesses, but it is known that the couple had not been getting on well together of late and that Mrs. Jantzen had a divorce suit pending against her husband in Poweshiek county district court.

Two Children

They were married Sept. 29, 1942, and had no children by this marriage. Mrs. Jantzen's two sons, Larry Sedrel, 8, and Donald Sedrel, 5, by a previous marriage, were in school at Gilman when the shooting occurred. Her former husband Verlin Sedrel, remarried and resides in Cedar Rapids.

two sons, Larry Sedrel, 8, and Donald Sedrel, 9, by a previous marriage, were in school at Gilman when the shooting occurred. Her former husband Verlin Sedrel, remarried and resides in Cedar Rapids.

Mr. and Mrs. Jantzen had been in Grinnell Friday morning, according to Sheriff Fred Cochran, and had called at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Parkhurst of 419 East street. Apparently there was no sign of friction at that time.

Neighbors Saw Them

Later on in the morning, at about 11:30, several of the neighbors along the road to their farm saw them drive by. Mrs. Jantzen is believed to have been starting to prepare lunch when she was shot. A cupboard was open and a loaf of bread was lying on the kitchen table, but the table had not yet been set. There was no sign of a struggle in the house and nothing appeared to have been disturbed.

Mr. and Mrs. Jantzen were in their work clothes and he was wearing his work cap, as if he had just come in from outdoors.

Neighbors said Saturday morning that Mr. Jantzen was an energetic farmer and that he had his spring plowing done and most of the crops in. Nearby friends are taking care of the chores on the farm pending a decision as to what will be done with the farm.

Wilbur Jantzen Funeral Sunday

Funeral services for Mr. Jantzen were held from the James funeral home in Grinnell Sunday afternoon at 2:30 and interment was made in the Sheridan cemetery. Rev. F. A. Moore was in charge of the final rites. Pallbearers were John Allen, Delmar Puls, Louis Puls, Paul Erickson, Elmer Luttman and Clayton Dimit.

Services For Mrs. Jantzen

Funeral services for Mrs. Jantzen were held at the James funeral home this morning at 10 o'clock and burial was made in the Forest cemetery at Oskaloosa. Rev. D. E.
