

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# \* Victor Nun, 2 Out Of State Men Die Instantly; 2 Others Injured

## Victor Nun, 2 Out Of State Men Die Instantly; 2 Others Injured

The Poweshick county portion of "Bloody Six" has claimed three more lives.

A Catholic nun from Victor and two men from out of state died instantly Friday afternoon in a 2-car crash on Highway 6 one-eighth of a mile west of the junction with Highway 398.

### Victims

The victims were:
Sister Mary Martina, 71, superior of St. John's School at Victor.
Calvin C. Toms, 59, Arvada,
Colo., a former resident of Mt.
Morris, Ill.

Vernon L. Arnold, 29, Oregon,

Two other Catholic nuns, also teachers at the Victor school, were involved in the accident and are now hospitalized in Grinnell. They are:
Sister Mary Geraldine, 55, in serious condition with multiple fractures of arms and legs.
Sister Mary Loretta Walsh, 56, in fair condition with fractured limbs.

They are still being checked for possible internal injuries.

Head-on Collision
The accident occured at about 1:15 p.m. The two vehicles collided almost headon in the south (eastbound) lane of the 2-lane highway.

A late model Volkswagen carried the two men.

The three nuns were riding in a 1964 Pontiac. Sister Mary Geraldine was driving with Sister Mary Martina in the right front seat and Sister Mary Loretta in the back seat. the back seat.

seat and Sister Mary Loretta in the back seat.

The Volkswagen was headed east and the Pontiac west at the time of the accident.

Local law officers have not been able to determine a cause for the accident. They theorize that the Sisters' automobile might have pulled onto the south lane of the highway while attempting to pass a third car and rammed headen into the Illinois vehicle.

No Skid Marks

There was no evidence of skid marks from either auto.

The larger Pontiac pushed the smaller foreign auto back about 45 feet before coming to a halt. The Volkswagen then skidded back another 15 feet before stopping.

The two men were pinned in the Volkswagen. The car had to be dragged into Brooklyn and pulled apart by two wreckers before their bodies could be re-

Sister Mary Martina was thrown

Sister Mary Martina was thrown from the Pontiac. She apparently died from head in juries received during the impact of the collision. Sister Mary Geraldine and Sister Mary Loretta were rushed to a Grinnell hospital by an ambulance from Des Moines which hapened onto the accident scene. The ambulance was returning to Des Moines after delivering a patient to a point in the east.

Henry Karrett and Jack Pearson, the ambulance drivers, are credited with possibly saving Sister Mary Geraldine's life by applying a tourniquet to one of her legs.

### Complete Losses

Both autos were considered complete losses. The front ends of both were completely demolished.

Poweshiek County Sheriff Wiley Taylor and Highway Patrolman Robert Klein of Marengo investigated.

Highway 6, which links two uncompleted segments of Interstate 80 between Grinnell and Coralville, is Iowa's most heavily traveled highway. Highway 398 is a stub road leading into Brooklyn.

The three deaths raised Powesnick county's 1964 traffic fatai-ity total to eight. In 1963, when the county registered an alt-time record of 10 traffic deaths, there were only four at a comparable



May 9—Michael Palmer, Grinnell, in a pickup truck-semi truck collision on Highway 146 just south of Grinnell.

February 23—John R. Shay, Des Moines, in a 2-car crash at the intersection of Highway 6 and Highway 21 in the eastern part of the county.

The death of Darrell Rautio, Hopkins, Minn., in a pickup truck accident on an uncompleted section of Interstate 80 on August 12 apparently does not count toward the county's traffic toll as was first believed. It was not counted as a traffic death as the highway is not yet open to traffic.
