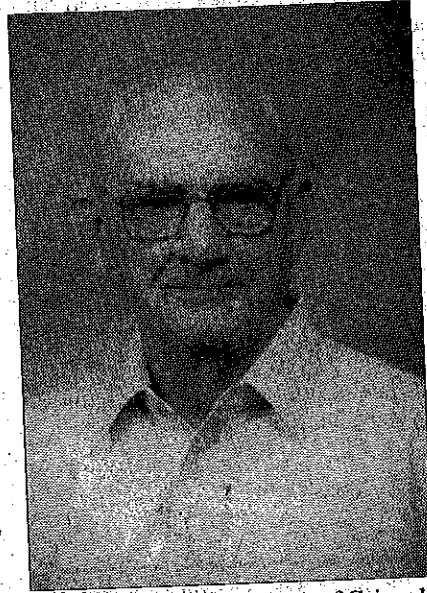


## James 'Joe' Pierce

He was an avid sports fan and particularly enjoyed following the Iowa Hawkeyes. James "Joe" Pierce, 85, of Grinnell died Saturday, Nov. 29, 2008, at Iowa Methodist Medical Center in Des Moines.

A funeral mass was held Wednesday, Dec. 3, at St. Mary's Catholic Church, with the Rev. Nick Adam officiating. Eulogists were the Revs. Walt and John Claussen. He was born Nov. 18, 1923, in Grinnell, the son of Robert and Addie Reavis Pierce. He was a 1941 graduate of Grinnell High School. He was a veteran of the United States Army Air Force during World War II having served with the 8th Air Force, 303rd Bomb Group in Molesworth, England. He was a ball turret gunner on a B-17 and was a member of the Caterpillar Club for having had to bail out of his bomber safely during a mission.

On Jan. 1, 1950, he was united in marriage with Mary Patricia Hotchkin at St. Mary's Catholic Church Rectory in Grinnell. The couple made their home in Grinnell. He was employed for nearly 22 years as a meat cutter at McNally's Grocery Store. He then was employed for six years at Grinnell College and retired from there in 1989. During his retirement he enjoyed working as a greenskeeper at the Grinnell Country Club.
