

MRS. C. M. BAILEY DIES.
2-10-1922
Former Grinnell Lady Passes Away at
Bayard—Burial in Hazelwood.

The body of Mrs. C. M. Bailey was brought to Grinnell Wednesday night, and burial took place in the family lot in Hazelwood Thursday.

Accompanying the body to Grinnell where her daughters, Mrs. A. D. Ocheltree and Miss Minnie Bailey of Bayard; and her son, Robert Bailey, and wife, of Des Moines.

There was a short service at the grave conducted by Rev. E. W. Cross of the Congregational church.

Sarah F. Bailey was born in Providence, Rhode Island, April 14, 1848, and died at Bayard, Iowa, Feb. 6, 1922, at the age of 73 years, 7 months and 22 days.

She came west when five years old and settled with her parents in Allamakee county, Iowa. She was united in marriage to Chas. M. Bailey shortly after the Civil War. She was the mother of nine children all of whom have passed away except four, and they are Mrs. A. D. Ocheltree of Bayard, Frank H. Bailey, Aspen, Colo., Minnie F. Bailey of Bayard, and Robert P. Bailey of Des Moines, Iowa.

After her marriage, she with her husband, moved to Sibley, Iowa, where she joined the Congregational church when she was twenty-three years of age, and became an active worker in the church and the welfare of the community.

From Sibley the family moved to Grinnell, Iowa, that they might better educate the children. The family resided in Grinnell eleven years, moving from here to Des Moines in 1899 because Mr. Bailey was employed in the office of Hon. J. A. Lyons, auditor of state.

Upon going to Des Moines Mrs. Bailey affiliated with the Presbyterian church where she was elected President of their Home and Foreign Missionary Society which office she held for over eight years.

After the marriage of her daughter to Mr. A. D. Ocheltree she made her home with them, and has lived with them until the time of her death except when she visited her children.
