

Old Time Resident 3 27 - 1930 Of County Dies

On Monday noon Mrs. Matt Calderwood and Mrs. Bert Dayton arrived from California with the body of Mathew Calderwood, who passed away last week.

Mathew J. Calderwood, a son of James and Henrietta Calderwood, was born at Davenport, Iowa, September 24th, 1858. He moved to Brooklyn, Poweshiek county, Iowa, on February 18, 1882.

He was married in Brooklyn on March 2, 1886, to Miss Minnie E. Whitcomb. Both of these parties had previously united with the Presbyterian Church of Brooklyn on the same occasion.

Mr. and Mrs. Calderwood lived on their farm near Brooklyn from the time of their marriage until in February, 1901, when they removed to Minnesota. Shortly thereafter, Mr. R. F. Wright, a brother-in-law of Mr. Calderwood, joined the latter in Minnesota, and for many years they carried on a banking business in Ruthton and a mercantile business in Pipestone. In 1918 Mr. Calderwood retired from active business and moved to Los Angeles where he has since made his home.

After an illness of several weeks, he passed to the great beyond on February 9, 1930.

He was loved and honored by a large circle of friends.

He leaves surviving his wife Minnie E. Calderwood of Los Angeles, five sisters and two brothers, Elizabeth Copeley of Marshalltown, Iowa, Roseanna Calderwood and Henrietta Hughes, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Caroline Wright and Sarah C. Dayton of Los Angeles, California, William C. Calderwood of Brooklyn, Iowa, and Rev. Charles M. Calderwood of Phoenix, Arizona.

Funeral services were held on February 12, 1930, in the B. E. Dayton funeral parlors at Los Angeles, Calif., conducted by his pastor Dr. Herbert Booth Smith, assisted by his life-long friend and former pastor, Dr. E. Benson of Portland, Oregon. Many former Brooklyn people attended.

The remains accompanied by Mrs. Calderwood and Mrs. Dayton reached Brooklyn on Monday and the funeral services were held on Tuesday, February 18, at the Presbyterian Church, conducted by Rev. W. M. Evans, acting pastor of the church, and Rev. R. G. Nye, pastor of the Methodist Church.

Interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Brooklyn where the Masonic burial service was conducted.
