

OBITUARY.

Mrs. J. J. Corrough.

Anna Winnifred Evans was born on March 13, 1869, at Williamsburg, Ia. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Evans. Her father was the pastor of the Congregational church of that place. She suffered the loss of her father before she was fifteen years of age. As a young woman she engaged in teaching in the country school. She thereby acquired the necessary means to attend college. She took her college course at Grinnell, graduating in June, 1895. She became assistant principal of the High school at Spencer, Ia., where she continued for two years. For six years she was principal of the High school at Le Mars, Ia.

On February 1, 1905, she was married to James J. Corrough of Grinnell, and her home has been here for the past ten years. Her first babe, a little daughter, died at three months of age in April, 1906. She leaves surviving her, two children, Winnifred, aged 8, and James, aged 6. She has led a busy and happy life, as wife and mother, a member of the Congregational church, as a cherished and honored member of a large group of relatives and friends interested and helpful in all phases of social and community life, with a keen mind and broad spirit, going steadily forward to new interests and achievements, till her increasing weakness and final sickness ended her earthly activities. She died Wednesday, October 13, 1915.

Besides her two children, and her husband, Mrs. Corrough is mourned by a large circle of kindred, including her aged mother, Mrs. E. J. Evans, in the old home at Williamsburg, two sisters and four brothers: John E. and Morris Evans, of Pipestone, Minn.; Edward Evans and Ellen E. Evans, of Williamsburg; Mrs. R. C. Craven, of Omaha, Neb., and William D. Evans, of Hampton, judge of the supreme court of Iowa. These have all been at her bedside in her last illness.

The funeral services, conducted by Rev. Charles Noble, were held at the home, 1100 Park street, Friday, October 15, and the burial was in Hazelwood cemetery.
