

Dora Ebert Dies After Long Illness

Dora Ebert, 64, died Wednesday of last week in the home of her sister, Mrs. Pauline Andrews, with whom she had made her home for many years. Miss Ebert had been in failing health for about two years.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at two o'clock at Bramer Funeral Home in charge of the Rev. G.H. Hulsebus. Organist was Mrs. Ed Bartachek.
