### Obituary.

George W. Elliott, son of Henry and Jane Anne Elliott, was born May 6, 1876, on a farm near Deep River, Poweshieck County, and passed away July 5, 1952, at the age of 74 years, 1 month, 29 days in the Community Hospital, Grinnell.

George lived in and around Deep River all of his life.

In January, 1908, he was united in marriage to Lydia Haag. To this union three children were born: Melvin, Margaret and Royal Frederic, who died at the age of three months.

Mr. Elliott is survived by his wife, Lydia; his son, Melvin, and daughter, Mrs. Stanley Hutchinson; three grandchildren, Mary Margaret Elliott, Lana Lou and Joe Elliott Hutchinson; one brother, John, who lives in Wapello; nieces, nephews, and a host of friends. He was preceded in death by three sisters and two brothers.

George was a member of the Methodist Church and Masonic Lodge.

### Big Cattle Man.

In the 1920s and 1930s the firm of Burgett and Elliott were great cattle raisers, specializing in Angus. Several times during those years the Deep River firm, topped the Chicago market. They became well known over the state and nation for their fine cattle, fair and honest dealings at all times.

Mr. Elliott was also in partnership with A. L. Silverman at one time. These two men raised and marketed purebred cattle over the country.

When in good health, Mr. Elliott at times operated from 500 to 600 acres of land, one of the big farmers in the county.
