

## Injuries Cause the Death of Clarence Gwin

Clarence Edward Gwin, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Gwin, was born a mile south of Victor, Iowa, August 2, 1904 and departed this life Jan. 5, 1931, at a hospital in Marshalltown, Iowa, at the age of 26 years, 5 mo. and 3 days.

He was a graduate of the Victor high school with the class of 1923, and was popular with his school-mates and teachers. After completing his course, he was engaged in farming at home; and for the past year has spent most of the time at the home of his sister, Mrs. Henry Stahl, Jr. in the Sheridan Community where he was working.

Clarence was loved by all who knew him and was always willing to lend a helping hand whenever opportunity offered.

Two weeks ago he met with an accident after which infection developed which spread rapidly and his condition became serious. He was taken from Tama to Marshalltown where all medical skill and care was given but in spite of this he passed away. He bore his suffering with great patience and fortitude and was always considerate of those who ministered to him.

He enjoyed attending Sunday School and was a regular attendant of the Congregational Sunday School and church at Victor when he was at home.

He leaves to mourn his loss, his father, mother, two brothers, Arnold at home and Paul Fry of Marshalltown, two sisters Margaret at home and Mrs. Esther Stahl of Malcom, a niece and nephew, Loraine and Lyle Stahl besides other relatives and many friends.

Funeral services were held Thursday, Jan. 8, from the Congregational church in Victor, at 2:30, conducted by Rev. H. L. Wissler of Chester Center and Rev. Harold Putney of Grinnell.
