Death Calls Mrs. F. Heinle

One of Grinnell's Good Women Answers Last Messenger Saturday Night.

FUNERAL SERVICES ARE HELD THIS AFTERNOON.

Mrs. Heinle Will Long be Remembered as a Lover of Flowers and All the Good Things of Life.

Expressions of sorrow were heard among the many friends of Mrs. Fred Heinle when they heard of her death which took place on Saturday night at eleven forty five, March 1st. Mrs. Heinle has been seriously ill since the Christmas time. For the last few days she had seemed somewhat better and her loved ones were hopeful that she might recover but there came a sudden turn on Saturday evening and she quietly fell on sleep. Mrs. Heinle was a remarkable woman. She was deeply religious and had a happy philosophy of life. She was an artist. These qualities of her life found expression in a genuine love for the beautiful in music, in beauty and in all growing things. Gardening was her delight and many were the plants that blossomed into profusion under her fostering care. Mrs. Heinle was practical. She was a hard worker and with her husband labored long and untiringly to establish the home and care for her family. The evidences of this industry are seen in the fine farm owned by them southeast of town and the homey cottage on Hamilton Ave. where they made their home since coming to Grinnell six years ago. She was a delightfully social person and was the life of any group in which she mingled. She will be missed by her family and friends but she lived her life well and, "Her children arise up, and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praiseth her."

Bertha Wiese, daughter of Henry and Wilhelmina Dehnk Wiese, was born Jan. 17, 1866 at Krokau, Province of Schleswig-Holstein, Germany. She was educated in the public schools of Germany. With her parents she came to the United States in March 1881, locating at Rock Island, Illinois. Later the family moved to Poweshiek County, Iowa. On Feb. 28, 1888 she was united in marriage with Mr. Fred Heinle and for forty-two years they journeyed through life together. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Heinle. George Heinle of Malcom, Mrs. Aline Schmidt and Mrs. Eleanor Hink of Grinnell. There are twelve grandchildren, six boys and six girls. Mrs. Heinle was a member of the St. John's Lutheran church in Grinnell, was a faithful member of the Ladies' Aid Society of that church and was very much interested in missionary work of the church. She was a member of the Rebekahs at Malcom. Members of this order will have charge of the services at the grave. She was a member of the Grinnell Woman's Club and took active interest in the gardening activities sponsored by the Club. Funeral services were held at the Methodist church this afternoon at two o'clock conducted by the Rev. George Blagg. Pall bearers were C. S. George, R. G. Coutts, Geo. C. Murray, Herman Ewaldt, Chris Vogt and Joe Speth. Burial was at Hazelwood.
