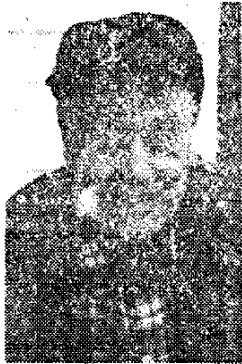

Dr. C. D. Hornbeck Dies at Age 81

A familiar figure in Deep River for half a century was buried here Jan. 9. Dr. C. D. Hornbeck, veterinarian, died Jan. 6 in Montezuma, at almost 81 years of age.



Clyde D., son of Mary Alice and James Hornbeck, was born in Chillicothe, Iowa, Jan. 12, 1888. He attended school in Chillicothe and was graduated from St. Joseph Veterinary college in St. Joseph, Mo., in 1916.

On Aug. 24, 1915, he was united in marriage with Rose Mollert in Jamestown, N.D. They established their home in Missouri, where he practiced veterinary medicine for one year. In 1917, he established his practice in Deep River, which he maintained for 46 years.

Mrs. Hornbeck passed away in 1963 and he maintained his home here until last October, when he moved to the hotel in Montezuma.

He was preceded in death by his wife; an infant son; an adopted son, James; two brothers and four sisters.

He is survived by two daughters, Shirley Evans of Des Moines, Iowa, and Arlene (Mrs. Charles) Rauch of Millersburg; four grandchildren; three sisters, Hulda Foster and Ida Eakins of Albia, and Elsie Foglesong of Ottumwa; other relatives and friends.

Services were at Steffy's Funeral Home in Montezuma under the direction of Rev. James Seeber. Burial was in the Goldenrod cemetery, Deep River.
