

Ambrose Jenkins Funeral Is Held

Funeral services for Ambrose F. Jenkins, who passed away Friday morning, were held Sunday afternoon from the Westfield church, conducted by Rev. H. L. Wissler. Favorite hymns were sung by a quartet composed of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Lord and Mr. and Mrs. Harvey P. Howell, with Miss Ellen Howell at the piano. Pall bearers were Ed Lynch, James Lynch, W. J. Nelson, S. J. Pooley, J. W. Norris and John Evans. Burial was in Westfield cemetery.

Ambrose F. Jenkins, the eldest son of Nehemiah and Angeline Jenkins, was born at Westfield May 4, 1858, and died in Grinnell on the morning of April 18. He leaves to mourn his loss a son, Harry Jenkins, and two sisters, Mrs. Edna Beeler and Mrs. Nellie Pitman, also a number of nieces and nephews.

He was married Jan. 25, 1893, to Anna Robinson and they lived on a farm east of Grinnell for a number of years. To this union two children were born, one dying in infancy.

For about twenty years Ambrose Jenkins was a familiar figure on the streets of Grinnell and he will be greatly missed by a host of friends.
