ELLA McLAIN LINEWEAVER

Ella Lineweaver, 71, a Hill county (Montana) resident since 1912, passed away Sunday, March 3, at 4:30 p.m.

Ella, daughter of Hugh and Ann Eliza McBride McLain, was born near Montezuma, Iowa, on Aug. 16, 1885, and passed away March 3, 1957, as a result of a coronary thrombosis.

When Ella was a small child her mother and her father were taken and she, together with her younger brother Matthew, were received into the home of their grandmother and grandfather McLain of Pleasant township, Poweshiek county, where they attended school and lived with their grandparents until they established homes of their own.

Ella was united in marriage Feb. 22, 1905, to C. B. Lineweaver, the ceremony occurring at the home of her grandparents. They made their home on a farm northeast of Montezuma until 1908 when they moved to a farm in North Dakota. In 1912 they moved to a farm near Inverness, Mont. They lived there until 1944 when they moved to 1028 Second Ave., Havre, Mont., where they have since resided.

Ella was a member of First

Presbyterian church, Havre. Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Ernest Greenland, pastor of the church, on Thursday, March 7, at 2 p.m.

Mrs. Ben Daggott and Mrs. Jack Angell sang "Abide With Me" and "The Old Rugged Cross," accompanied by Mrs. Hans Jensen.

Pallbearers were Geo. Sherman, Tom Furlong, Norman Kaercher, Oscar Ryan, and Dr. W. J. Templeton. Interment was in Sunset Memorial Gardens cemetery at Havre.

Survivors include her husband, C. B. Lineweaver, 1028 2nd Ave., Havre; a son, Lewis, of Havre, one grandson, Charles of Inverness, one great granddaughter, Susan; also two aunts, Anna Coop of Grinnell and Agnes Swanson of Illinois; one uncle, John McLain of Minot, N. Dak., besides a host of cousins and dear friends to mourn her loss. Her brother Matthew preceded her in death in February, 1951.
