DEATH OF MRS. MOLER.

Our entire community was saddened Sunday morning when it was announced that Mrs. Jno. Moler had died during the night. While her serious and dangerous illness was generally known, nevertheless the announcement of her demise came as a great shock to the community which had known the deceased so long and so well. For months she patiently bore her sufferings, and when it was plain to her and her family that she would not recover, she expressed a readiness and willingness to pay the debt that is demanded of all humanity, so with an unflinching trust in her Saviour and a steadfast belief in the promises set forth in the scriptures, she met the grim monster in peace. She made all preparations as to the funeral, gave directions to many details, and with that calm resignation that comes to those who fully trust she passed over the river in triumph. The deceased was a most excellent woman. She was a genuine christian both in faith and practice. She believed in doing good not only because it was right, but because of the happiness that came from a faithful discharge of duty. In church work she was enthusiastic and prompt in obeying the behests of her Master. She was a good neighbor, a kind and affectionate wife and mother, and a friend in whom there was no guile. She lived to see her three daughters grown to noble womanhood, and left to them and to the bereaved husband the sweet benediction of an exemplary life, which will be an inspiration to them in all the coming years. In the great sorrow that has come to them the sympathy of the entire community is freely extended. The funeral took place Tuesday morning at ten o'clock, conducted by Rev. P. J. Hennessy. A large number of friends and neighbors were present to pay a last tribute of respect to the memory of the deceased.

Nancy Margaret Myers was born in Augusta county, Virginia, June 26, 1848. She moved to Iowa county, Iowa, with her parents when she was seven years of age. October 21, 1869, she was married to John Moler. To this union were born three daughters - Elizabeth, Corn and Jennie. The family moved to Montezuma in 1881. February 17, 1884, she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church and was a faithful member of the same. She died Saturday night, September 8, 1900.
