

Dr. Molsberry Dies; Services Wednesday

Dr. Frank Molsberry, a former Grinnell dentist, died Saturday in Cedar Rapids. He was 46.

Dr. Molsberry was attending a concert with his wife, his son and his son's girl friend when he was stricken with a heart attack. Attempts at mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and the services of a doctor in the audience failed and he was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital.

Services Wednesday

Memorial services will be held at the Congregational Church at 30 N. Clinton Street in Iowa City at 7 p.m. Wednesday. The Rev. Robert E. Dewey of Kalamazoo, Michigan, former pastor of the United Church of Christ here, will participate in the services.

Dr. Molsberry is survived by his wife, Connie; three sons, Bill, Robert and David; his mother, Mrs. W. I. Molsberry of Burlington; and his sister, Mrs. Robert Helen Hale, also of Burlington.

A native Grinnellian, Dr. Molsberry was born here January 1, 1925. He was graduated from Grinnell High School and attended Grinnell College. He completed his

schooling at the University of Iowa, receiving his bachelor's degree in 1949, his Masters in 1950 and his DDS in 1954.

Following graduation, Dr. Molsberry returned to Grinnell and practiced dentistry here from 1951 through 1966. At that time, he moved to Iowa City where he was an instructor on the University staff, serving in that capacity until his death.

Dr. Molsberry was a member of the American Dental Association; the Iowa State Dental Association; past president of the Des Moines District Dental Association; member of several county and district dental associations; member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon, an Honorary Dental Society; member of the Psi Omega Dental Fraternity; a member of the Congregational Church choirs both in Grinnell and Iowa City; and a member of the O'd Capitol Chorus and Iowa City Chamber Singers.
