Constance Moye, 87, of the Mayflower Home died Sunday afternoon, June 15, at the Mayflower Home's health care center.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the Smith Funeral Home, with the Rev. Philip Ramstad of the United Church of Christ—Congregational officiating. Graveside services were held at 3 p.m. at the Rose Hill Cemetery at Manson.

The daughter of W.M. and Josephine Mundhenk Beardshear, she was born Dec. 16, 1892, at Ames, where her father served as president of Iowa State College. She attended Ames schools, graduating from high school there in 1911. In 1915, she received her bachelor's degree in home

economics from Iowa State.

During World War I, she served as a secretary in the office of the dean of industrial science at Iowa State. She was married to Ralph A. Moye, D.V.M., on May 28, 1919. They lived for a short time in Xenia, Ohio, moving to Manson in 1929 where her husband established a veterinary practice. They moved to Manchester in 1925. Following Dr. Moye's death, she and her family moved to Ames.

Mrs. Moye served as a hostess at Iowa State's Memorial Union, coming to Grinnell in 1958.

She is survived by her two children, Mrs. W.D. (Jane) Blakemore of Denver, Colo., and Jack Moye, D.V.M., of Junction City, Ore.; six grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, two sisters, and three brothers.

Constance Moye was born December 16, 1892, in Ames, Iowa, the daughter of W. M. and Josephine Mundhenk Beardshear, a former President of Iowa State University. She attended the Ames Public Schools, graduating from Ames High School in 1911. In 1915 she received the degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics at Iowa State College. During World War I she was secretary in the office of the Dean of Industrial Science at Iowa State.

On May 28, 1919 she was married to Dr. Ralph A. Moye, who was practicing Veterinary Medicine in Xenia, Ohio. In the Fall of 1920 they moved to Manson, Iowa, and established a Veterinary practice. Their children, Jane and Jack, were born in Manson. In 1925, Dr. Moye accepted a position in the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Iowa State Department of Agriculture, and was in charge of Tuberculosis Eradication in cattle in northeastern Iowa. The family lived in Manchester, Iowa, after the death of her husband, Ralph, in 1937, and the children moved to Ames so that she could care for her elderly mother and her mother's bachelor brother, Charles Mundhenk. Later, after the death of her mother and uncle, she was hostess for four years at the Memorial Union at Iowa State. In the summer of 1958 she became a resident of Mayflower Home in Grinnell. She is survived by her two children, Mrs. Jane W. D. Blakemore of Denver, Colorado; and Dr. Jack Moye, D.V.M. of Junction City, Oregon; six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Constance died Sunday afternoon, June 15, 1980 at the Mayflower Home in Grinnell. She was preceded in death by her husband, parents, two sisters and three brothers.

Funeral services were held at 10 A.M. Wednesday, June 13, 1980, at the Smith Funeral Home in Grinnell with the Rev. Philip J. Ramstad, minister of the Grinnell United Church of Christ-Congregational, officiating.
