# HUSBAND AND WIFE UNITED IN DEATH

Double Interment in Hazelwood Cemetery Today for Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McCaulley.

DEATH DIVIDED THEM  
LESS THAN 24 HOURS

Mr. and Mrs. McCaulley Were Iowa Pioneers and Former Grinnell Residents.

The death of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McCaulley at Victor this week removes from life two tried and true Iowa pioneers who have given much to upbuild its material interests.

Joseph McCaulley was a son of John and Rebecca McCaulley and was born in Ohio on Oct. 27, 1843. He departed this life on March 5, 1924, aged 80 years, 4 months and 6 days.

His parents removed to Iowa in 1846, settling in Davis county, and in 1849 the father went to California with the other seekers for gold. Joseph McCaulley grew to young manhood in Davis county and at the age of 18 enlisted in the service of his country as a member of Company E, Third Iowa Cavalry. He served to the close of the war, participating in the campaigns in Missouri, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama, also taking part in Sherman's March to the Sea.

At the close of the war he returned to Davis county and on Dec. 29, 1865, was united in marriage to Miss Harriet Jane Smith. He took up farming and continued that occupation in Davis county until 1884 when he and his family moved to Tama county, residing there for 12 years. He then

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removed to a farm 9 miles southwest of Albia in Monroe county where he lived 11 years. He then retired from farming and moved to Grinnell in 1907 to make his home. About four years ago Mr. and Mrs. McCaulley came to Victor and made their home with their daughter, Miss Byrd, where she and her sister, Mrs. Cora Brookens, gave them the loving care and attention their declining years demanded.

Mr. McCaulley was one of a large family of children but is now survived by a brother and sister at Ellsworth, Kan., and a brother at Iliff, Colo, none of whom are able to come to the funeral.

Mrs. McCaulley's maiden name was Harriet Jane Smith, daughter of Andrew and Sallie Fleener Smith. She



was born in Des Moines county, Iowa, Nov. 16, 1845, and at the time of her death, Mar. 4, 1924, was aged 78 years, 3 months and 16 days. She was the mother of 11 children, eight of whom survive. They are John A. of Monroe county, Wilbur D. of Tama City, Wm. E. of Grinnell, Mrs. Hattie Korus of Newton, Walter B. of Hamilton, Homer of Malcom, Mrs. Cora Brookens and Miss Byrd McCaulley of Victor.

Mrs. McCaulley was a true companion to her husband, sharing the hardships and privations of the early life, a real mother to her large family and her memory will ever be held in Hazelwood.

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. McCaulley of Grinnell and Mr. and Mrs. Homer McCaulley of Malcom went to Victor yesterday to be present at the funeral.

Mr. and Mrs. McCaulley were members of the United Brethren church, uniting in 1887, and remaining faithful to the last.

The double funeral was held yesterday at 2:30 o'clock at Victor conducted by Rev. Mr. Maxwell, pastor of the Congregational church of that place. The remains were brought to Grinnell on No. 9 today and burial was

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
