Mrs. Oda McCoy, daughter of Virgil and Jennie Butrum Roberts, was born January 18, 1887, in Lynnville and passed away March 14, 1964, in Community hospital in Grinnell at the age of 87 years.

She had been in failing health for several months. She maintained a keen interest in all affairs of her family, the community and world events.

She grew to womanhood in Lynnville and received her education in the Lynnville school. She was united in marriage to George B. McCoy on Nov. 22, 1933, and together they established their home in Lynnville where they lived all of their married life with the exception of a few years spent in New Sharon and Montezuma. They returned to Lynnville in 1954.

To this union three children were born: Dale McCoy of Richardson, Texas; Mrs. Charles (Bernice) Quire of Lynnville; one daughter, Vera, passed away in 1911 at the age of 10 years.

She was a member of the Mary White Chapter of the O. E. S., the Holly Rebekah Lodge and the Good Will Club. She was a member of the Missionary Society of the Lynnville Friends church as long as health permitted. She retained her membership in the Methodist church in Montezuma.

She was a devoted wife, a loving mother and grandmother, a kind and thoughtful friend and neighbor. In all of these areas of her life she was a blessing and all mourn her passing.

She was preceded in death by her parents, one brother, one daughter.
