

Mrs. Newton Passes Away

Nonagenarian Dies At Her Home
Here at Ripe Age of 90
Years

FUNERAL SERVICES ARE
HELD THIS AFTERNOON

Mrs. Newton Had Lived in Grinnell or in This Vicinity
Since 1867

Few women live to the age of 90 years but that is the fortune that came to Mrs. T. M. Newton, who died Saturday evening at 9 o'clock, April 2.

Georgiana Olesna Newton was born in Bergen, Norway on March 13, 1842. She came to America with her parents when she was 15 years of age. She spent her early years in Primrose, Wis. At an early age she united with the Lutheran church and her chief delight through life has been in the service of her Master.

On Jan. 1, 1867, she was united in marriage to T. M. Newton. The same spring they moved to Grinnell where they located on a farm five miles southeast of town. In 1887 they moved to their present home where she resided until her death.

Mrs. Newton will be remembered by many for her ministrations during pioneer days when she went on many cases with the late Dr. Clark.

A kind family cared for her during her last hours and did all that loving hearts could do to fill them with cheer and comfort. Funeral services were held at the Methodist Episcopal church at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, conducted by Rev. A. B. Cadwell.
