AT THE CHURCHES.

E. G. Paine.

As a shock to the entire community came the news of the death of E. G. Paine, or "Ted" Paine as his many friends knew him, on Wednesday morning at 12:30. For the two weeks preceding his death, his condition had been recognized as serious, but not until a few days before, was any imminent danger seen. The death was due to heart failure.

Mr. Paine had been a resident of Grinnell for the past seventeen years, moving here immediately after his marriage from his former home and birth-place at Newton. During that time he has been constantly in the employ of the Rock Island company, up to last September, when a severe cut in his wrist from a broken window pane, severed the arteries, and forced him to leave his position as agent.

Never from that time did Mr. Paine fully recover his old health and it is thought that the accident bore him directly to his death. He was able to be about on the streets up to within a few weeks of his death.

His wife, and two little daughters, Ruth, aged 16, and Dorothy, aged 10, are the members of his immediate family left to mourn his loss. One sister in Grinnell, and a mother and sister in Texas, are other near relatives living. His mother was prevented from coming to attend her son in his illness and death, by her own failing health, and his sister in Texas was forced to remain to care for her.

Mr. Paine was aged 39, his birthday falling on December 29. He was a strong and influential member of the Knights of Pythias, who had charge of the funeral services held at the home yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. T. A. Dungan was the minister in charge of the services. The interment was made in the Hazelwood cemetery.
