

## Henrietta Rohr, Polio Victim From Girlhood, Dies <sup>H-R</sup>

Henrietta Louise Rohr, paralyzed by an attack of polio when she was 11 years old, died Friday morning in a local hospital aged 44 years. Miss Rohr was the daughter of Charles and Rosa Beck Rohr and was born at the home farm in Malcom township, Dec. 21, 1908.

Her illness occurred when she was in the fifth grade and after that she studied at home. She had lived all her life on the same farm.

During her years of forced inactivity Miss Rohr occupied her time with reading, light craft work, fancy work and photo coloring. In 1950, under the vocational rehabilitation division of the state of Iowa, she took a correspondence course in reweaving of damaged garments.

Survivors are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rohr, five brothers, Erwin of Lynn, Mass., Oscar of Portland, Oregon, Carl of Searsboro, John of Marengo and Johring of Grinnell, and five nephews. Miss Elizabeth Rohr, the city nurse, is an aunt.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Trinity Lutheran church on Highway 63, in charge of Rev. G. C. Wiegand. Mr. and Mrs. Edward Bohstedt provided the music.

Pall bearers were Ervir Schultz, Leo and LaVerne Kelm, Raymond Schilder, Raymond White and Wayne Gropper. Burial was in the Lutheran cemetery near the church.
