—Mr. I. W. Smith died at the home of
his daughter, Mrs. E. M. Hathaway, early
Sunday morning, and was laid to rest in
Hazelwood cemetery yesterday after-
noon. The funeral services were con-
ducted at the house at 2:30 p. m. yester-
day, by the Rev. Edmund M. Vittum.
Mr. Smith was born January 10, 1810, at
Farmington, New York. On the 7th day
of May, 1834, he was married to Miss Lu-
cinda M. Parker. From this union five
children were born, three of whom died
in infancy. The only remaining son
passed away in Kansas in 1875. Mrs. E.
M. Hathaway alone of his children sur-
vives him. Mr. and Mrs. Smith came to
live with their daughter in 1873, the wife
passing away in 1879. He was born
and reared in the Quaker faith and lived
a consistent life, revering all that is holy
and divine, and having an abounding
faith in his Maker. He led a modest,
reticent, retiring life, had a circle of in-
timate friends and was respected and
honored by all who knew him. His life
has been a lonely one, the circumstances
that brought him west being more than
he could bear.
