

A Grand Old ⁴⁻ ₁₉₃₀ Lady Passes On

Laura Augusta Tyler was born in Princeton, Ill., March 19, 1862 and departed this life June 27, 1930, aged 68 years, 3 months and 8 days. She was born in the stormy days of the Civil War and left without a father at the age of three, her father, August Warner, Corporal, Co. K, 93rd Infantry, having been killed in the battle of Vicksburg. After the war her mother married Henry Broders and they came to this locality and settled on a farm north of Malcom, early settlers of that community.

On Nov. 9, 1880 she married William W. Tyler, and came to live on the farm just west of Malcom where she has lived practically all the time since with the exception of when she was living in her home in Malcom or visiting with some of her children.

She reared to manhood and womanhood three sons and two daughters, all of whom with eight grandchildren survive her. As thru life, she was very cheerful and happy up to the end, and she said that her life had been so full that she was ready. Her husband preceded her March 18, 1907. She had been a member of the local M. E. church for many years.

On account of the distance the eldest son, Geo. W. Tyler, of Seattle, was unable to come.
