*Mrs. Elizabeth Wallace.*

The body of Mrs. Elizabeth Wallace was brought to Grinnell last evening from Marshalltown, where she died on Wednesday evening at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Henry C. Boggie, where she had been visiting since before Thanksgiving. Mrs. Wallace was 84 years of age and suffered from heart trouble and congestion of the lungs. She was the widow of Warren P. Wallace. The funeral was held at 2 o'clock this afternoon from the Wallace home, 403 Park street. M. C. Wallace, of Omaha, F. S. Wallace, of Springfield, Mo., Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Boggie, son Wallace and daughter Helen, of Marshalltown, and Ed Morris, of Omaha, came from out of town to be present.

Mrs. Wallace was one of Grinnell's pioneer residents and highly esteemed women. She had lived in the same home here for fifty-eight years. The following review of her life is from the Marshalltown Times Republican:

"Mrs. Wallace was born Elizabeth Lobbell in Alleghany county, New York, November 4, 1823. She spent her girlhood in her native county, and as a young woman went to Michigan where,

at Ypsilanti, in 1855, she became wife of Mr. Wallace. Mr. and Mrs. Wallace came to Grinnell directly at their marriage, and there Mr. Wallace died seven years ago last August.

"Seven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Wallace, and six of them are living. They are M. C. Wallace, of Omaha; Scott Wallace, of Old Mexico; F. S. Wallace, of Springfield, Mo.; Frank Wallace, of Grinnell; Mrs. Boggie, and Mrs. E. E. Craver, of Riceville, who is now a patient in St. Thomas hospital in this city, recovering from a recent surgical operation. Another daughter, Mrs. Margaret MacDonald, died five years ago. One sister and two brothers are also living, in the persons of Mrs. Lucinda Burdick, of Nile, N. Y. and William and Henry Lobbell, of Muskegon, Mich.

"Mrs. Wallace had for many years been a member of the Adventist church of Grinnell."
