

Oliver Wildman ^{C-11} 7-24-28 Buried At Lynnville

Lynnville, Ia., July 23, Special:

Funeral services for Oliver Wildman who died at the home of his son Grant Wildman at Keokuk were held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock at the A. T. Gifford residence. Services were in charge of Rev. L. W. Reynolds. A quartet composed of Mrs. Leo. Davis, Mrs. Will Allee, A. T. Gifford and Charles Wagaman furnished the music. Burial was in the Friends Cemetery by the side of his wife who passed away thirteen years ago.

Obituary.

Oliver Wildman, son of Martin and Mary Ann Wildman, was born near Philadelphia, Penn., Nov. 9, 1833, and died at the home of his son, H. G. Wildman of Keokuk, July 17, 1928, aged 94 years, 8 months and 8 days.

When a young man he moved with his parents to Ohio, near Marietta, where he lived until the spring of 1871, when he moved to New Sharon, where he resided until 1897. In that year he moved to Lynnville, and lived there until his wife died, Aug. 5, 1915. Since that time he has made his home with his son, H. G. Wildman of Keokuk, Ia.

When a young man he started a store in Ohio, which he sold when he moved to Iowa, and bought a farm. Soon after coming to Iowa he again started in business, and this he continued to operate until 1893 when he retired to his farm. Selling his farm he again started in business in Lynnville with his son-in-law, C. F. Briggs. His eye sight became impaired to such an extent that he was forced to retire from business in 1913.

Oliver Wildman and Hannah Bailey were married March 20, 1859 and to this union six children were born, four of whom with his wife preceded him in death. He is survived by two sons, I. B. Wildman of Oskaloosa and H. G. Wildman of Keokuk, one sister living in Ohio, and 15 grandchildren and 25 great-grand children.
