Smith Funeral Home was in charge of funeral arrangements.

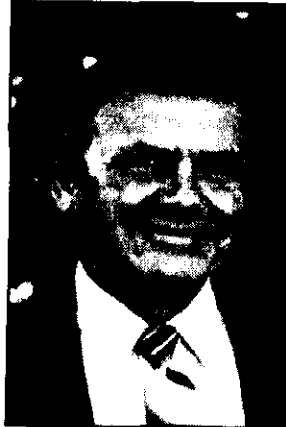
