For several months Mr. Evans id been in falling sheaith. He ent some weeks in the hospi-Then for a short time: he as back in his office but when e was forced to return to the pospital it became apparent that he end was hot far away. His eath occasioned no surprise but deep and sincere regret throughbut the entire community.

Funeral services, were held this afternoon from the James Funeral Home, conducted by Dr. J. Nollen, with burial in Hazel-wood cemetery. The Masonic rit-ial was performed at the grave Pall bearers were Willis Evans, Leonard Evans, Donovan Evans, Dawson Holmes, Sherman Mackin and Lyman Evans. Music was provided by J. Forrest West, head of the Grinnell College Department of Music, accompanied by Norman Goodbrod.

It is noteworthy that the death of Mr. Evans followed by only a few weeks the passing of H. P. Baustian, with whom he had worked shoulder to shoulder for so many years in building up the Poweshick County Farmers, Mutual Insurance association to the enviable position which it occupies among the farmers mu-tuals of the state. Mr. Evans became secretary of the association in 1905. Mr. Baustian was elected vice-president in 1908 and succeeded to the presidency in 1913. Both, men had held office continuoualy ever since.

Held Many Offices At the time of his death Mr. Evans was secretary-treasurer both of the Poweshiek County Farmers Mutual Insurance sociation and the Farmers Mu-tual Reinsurance association. He was president of the Iowa Mutua Tornado Insurance association of Des Moines, and a director of the Allied Mutual Casualty Co. and the Grinnell State-Bank of which he was the first president. He was also a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Congregational church. He was a member of the city council in 1915 and for a number of years was secretary of the Farmers Elevator company.

Born In England . John Evans was born Oct., 30. 1865, in Ross Herefordshire. England, the son of John and Esther Simpking Evans, He came to this The family settled first at Day tinuously ever since.

enport and moved to Poweshick county about 1881.

Mr. Evans grew to manhood in this locality. On March 19, 1889, he was married to Miss Matilda Sulser and to this union two children were born, Mildred, now Mrs. Jack Hall of Livermore. Colo. and Harold S. Evans, wno is following in his father's footsteps as president of the Allied Mutual Casualty company of Des Moines.

Mr. and Mrs. Evans lived for a time on the farm now occupied by Judson Blakely south of town, where he was a partner of A. J. Blakely, Sr., in the raising of Merino sheep. He also taught school in the winter months in connection with his farm work.

After he became secretary of the Poweshiek County Farmers Mutual he moved to the farm across the road east of the old foir grounds and Milit a fine home. The farm was one of the best improved in this section of the county.

In 1914 he sold the farm to 3 H. Rowe and moved to Orinnell, country with his parents in 1870, where he has made als home con-

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
