Young David Peck Died Last Thursday.

David Peck, 12-year old son of Prof. and Mrs. David E. Peck, died in a Boone hospital about 10:00 p. m. last Thursday, a victim of infantile paralysis.

Professor and Mrs. Peck were visiting Mrs. Peck's mother at Ogden when young David took ill a week ago today. He grew steadily worse, the disease affecting his throat, and on Wednesday he was rushed to Boone.

Services were held at the James funeral home yesterday at 10:00 a. m. Dr. John S. Nollen conducted the rites, assisted by Rev. Leland Mann. The body was to be taken to Des Moines today for cremation.

David was a sunny little chap, very popular with his school-mates and was described by his teachers as an excellent student. He would have been in eighth grade this year. He was truly his father's pride and joy, and the sincerest sympathy of the community goes out to his family upon his tragic death.

Surviving, besides David's parents, are three sisters: Ruth, who is a clerical worker in the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minn.; Kathleen, who is the wife of Dr. Everett Lewis of Houston, Tex.; and Ruth, who is married to Marion Owenby of Pullman, Wash.
