Arthur Timm, 93, of Victor died Saturday, July 26, 2008, at Grinnell Regional Medical Center.

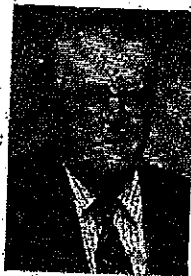

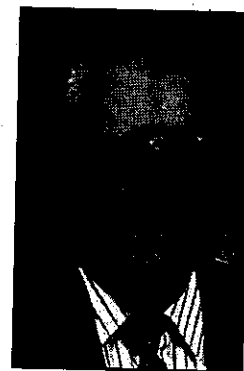
