

Agnes B. Callahan, 82

Agnes B. (Kenyon) Callahan, age 82, of Hatfield, Ark., and a former Victor and Hartwick-area resident, passed away on Thursday, March 17, 2005, in Mena, Ark.

She was cremated under the direction of Beasley-Wood Funeral Home, Mena, Ark. A memorial service was held on Saturday, March 19, at the First United Methodist Church in Hatfield, with the Rev. Dan Williams officiating. Graveside services were held at Memorial Cemetery in Brooklyn on March 25. They were conducted by the Rev. Dennis W. Smith, minister of the Madison Church of Christ.
