FRANCISCO AND SEATTLE. San Francisco was surprised to find San Francisco in so backward a state," said Selden, who has just returned from the west. "Even today, a year after the earthquake, it is a terrible sight to see. There are ruins everywhere and bare spaces. It will take years and years to rebuild. The thing which is retarding San Francisco's growth is her terrible conditions. It is probably the worst labor union ridden city in the country. While we were there the car men were out on a strike. I saw them one day cut a car loose from the top of a high hill and let it roll down through the business district until it ended up in the middle of a business block, doing considerable damage. And the desperate, repulsive looking characters which I saw idle on the streets or paying cents to ride in cabs instead of cents on the cars in order to spite the railway company was frightful. Their looks were sullen and defiant. It made one realize something of the character of the class of citizens which have given the city its men of Schmitz and Rueff and incidentally its bad reputation. One could help comparing San Francisco's terrible plight with the progressive cities of the coast which have benefited greatly through Frisco's loss.
