

Evelyn Mae Boyd, professor emerita of English at Grinnell College, died in a hospital at Waterloo, Ontario, Canada on Dec. 24 at the age of 90.

Born on June 3, 1893, in Oelwein, Ms. Boyd was graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Grinnell College in 1918 and received a master's degree in English at the University of Chicago in 1920. After teaching for many years, she was awarded the Ph. D. degree in English and comparative literature at Columbia University in 1954.

Ms. Boyd began her teaching career at the State Teachers College in DeKalb, IL, and shortly thereafter, in 1923, joined the faculty at Grinnell College as an instructor. She was promoted to assistant professor of English in 1927, associate professor in 1954, and professor in 1957.

From 1942 to 1946 she served with the American Red Cross during and after World War II and received the Presidential Citation for her work.

A writer of fiction and poetry, Ms. Boyd was the winner of a first-place award in the Atlantic Monthly Short Story Contest in 1939. She was also co-editor of the volume "Masters of English Literature," a college anthology, and wrote articles on various topics in literature.

Ms. Boyd was a member of the Medieval Academy of America, the Chaucer Society, and the Modern Language Association. She was listed in the Directory of American Scholars and Who's Who of American Women.

On her retirement from Grinnell College in 1958, Ms. Boyd held a teaching position at the Wilfrid Laurier University in Canada and later taught English at the University of Waterloo in Ontario.

Ms. Boyd leaves no survivors in her immediate family, a brother having preceded her in death.
