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Locals Killed in Plane Crash

A small plane carrying four Iowans crashed into a wooded area in Southern Illinois on New Years Eve. The crash left no survivors.

Johnson County, Ill., Coroner David Rockwell identified the four victims as Jordan Linder, 35, of Keswick; Jasmine Linder, 26, of Barnes City; Krista Green, 37, of Altona, and Curt Terpstra, 34, of Pella.

Terpstra was the pilot and owner of the aircraft.

The plane, a single-engine Piper, crashed in woods near the southern Illinois town of Vienna Saturday night.

The coroner said the crash is believed to have occurred around 5:30 p.m. on Dec. 31.

When authorities arrived at the scene, the plane's tail number was recovered and they were able to match that with records identifying Terpstra as the owner.

Online federal records show the plane was a Piper model PA-28R-200, built in 1969.

The wreckage is in the process of being moved into an enclosed facility so they can take a closer look into the cause of

the accident.

The crash happened in a heavily wooded area outside of Vienna, between St. Louis, Mo., and Nashville, Tenn.

Terpstra, a North Mahaska graduate, used the plane for his crop dusting business.

Two of the passengers were siblings and Montezuma graduates, Jordan Linder (MHS

Four Iowans killed in Illinois plane crash

A small plane that slammed into southern Illinois woods on New Year's Eve was carrying four Iowans, the local coroner confirmed Monday evening.

All four died at the scene. One of them was identified as the plane's owner, Curt Terpstra, 34, of Pella.

Johnson County, Ill., Coroner David Rockwell said Terpstra was the pilot. Rockwell identified the other three victims as Jordan Linder, 35, of Keswick, Jasmine Linder, 26, of Barnes City, and Krista Green, 37, of Altoona.

The plane, a single-engine Piper, crashed in woods near the southern Illinois town of Vienna Saturday night.

Eric Weiss, a spokesman for the National Transportation Safety Board, said other officials gave his agency the plane's tail number, N2806R. That number corresponds to a plane owned by Terpstra. Online federal records show the plane was a Piper model PA-28R-200, built in 1969.

Weiss said investigators

hope to have the wreckage moved into an enclosed facility by Tuesday, so they can take a closer look into what caused the accident.

A nearby resident, Tim Oliver, told WPSD-TV that the plane flew low near his house.

"Ten or 15 seconds later, we heard the crash," he said. Oliver said it took rescuers a substantial amount of time to find the wreck in the darkened woods.

Terpstra's sister-in-law told the TV station he co-owned a crop-dusting business and a masonry company with his brother.
