Montezuma's Member of the S. A. T. C.
at Ames Passes
Away.

WAS FINE YOUNG MAN
WHO DID HIS FULL DUTY

Gave Life When But a Mere Boy—
Body Is Buried at
Montezuma.

Harry E. Hutchinson was born March 28, 1899, and passed away October 25, 1918, aged 19 years, 6 months. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Hutchinson of Montezuma; two sisters, Mrs. H. B. Burns of Victor and Mrs. Earl Shearer of Montezuma.

Harry graduated from the Montezuma high school with the class of 1917. His desire was for a college education but he chose to secure it for himself and not at the expense of his parents, consequently he was working to that end. During the past summer he worked three months in the arsenal at Rock Island, Ill. When it came time for him to register he was offered deferred classification if he would remain in the employ of the arsenal. He refused saying that he would give no occasion to be called a slacker.

When the government established the S. A. T. C. in the colleges and universities it offered to Harry the opportunity for which he had been looking—the opportunity for an education, or, if needed, service in the army of the United States.

Friday, September 27, 1918, he enlisted in the S. A. T. C. at the Iowa State College at Ames. Monday, September 30, he entered the college for a course in electrical engineering to which he had been looking forward. He successfully passed the examinations for both the navy and the army and was enrolled as an army student.

He entered upon his duties with his usual determination and thoroughness, and after but a few days of the regular routine and helping to care for the sick he was stricken with influenza, followed by pneumonia from which he was unable to rally and which burned out his young life so full of promise.

He united with the Methodist Episcopal church in Montezuma, April 4, 1915, and was a member of the church and Sunday school at the time of his death.
