Wendell Macy of Sugar Creek Passes
Away at Base Hospital at
Ames.

MACY WAS A MEMBER

OF THE S. A. T. C.

Belonged to a Well known and Honored Family of Early Settlers in Poweshick County.

As noted last week, Wendell Macy whose home was in Sugar Crock township, died of influenza at the State Agricultural College, Oct. 16. Macy was one of the many strong young men of high ideals who have voluntarily entered the service of Uncle Sam.

Mr. Mae was a young man of most excellent parks who understood the needs of this war, and entered into propagation for it.

His parents were Quakers and he had been reduced up to this fall at Dent college. He went to Ames because it offered a course in nulitary trading for students. While there he fell a victin to pneumonia.

Wendell Harlan Maey, eldest son of flarian and Lonotte Maey, was born in Poweshick county, lowa, near Lynn-yille, January 16, 1897, and grew to manhood in the farm where his parents still fiside.

high school in 1914, and attended Penn
College two years.

Wendell was a clean, manly, lovable boy, always choosing the ways that lead to honor and usefulness. He was a source of great joy to his parents and loved ones, remarkably faithful to home and purents. He accepted Christ as Lord of his life during his years at college and soon after became a member of the Friends church and has since been consistent in his Christian life.

iRealizing his country's need of his service headenlisted in the Auto Mechanics Training Detachment and left for Ames August 15, 1918, where he has since been busily engaged in training for his service and also helping his comrades in training who were ill. He has just as truly given his life for his country as if he had been "Over There."
