

Funeral Services Today For Mrs. James Hannay

Funeral services were held from the Smith Funeral Home this afternoon for Mrs. Alice Chloe Dunham Hannay, wife of James R. Hannay, who passed away Monday afternoon. Mrs. Hannay would have been 76 years old on her next birthday, Nov. 22. She was born in Neponset, Ill. The services were conducted by Rev. Walter H. North, pastor of the Congregational church. Appropriate music was rendered by Mrs. Roscoe Dempster and Mrs. D. Miller. Pallbearers were Edward Dunham, C. S. George, Edward Hannay, Thomas McIlrath, Sam Parker and S. J. Pooley. Interment was in Hazelwood cemetery.

Alice Chloe Dunham Hannay, daughter of Cornelius Lansing Dunham and Mary Pratt Buswell Dunham, was born in Neponset, Illinois, November 21, 1869. She was one of a family of seven children, all of whom but one have joined the great majority. Those having passed away were three brothers, Edward, Lansing and Ralph, and two sisters, Mrs. Ida G. Blackwell and Miss Mary C. Dunham. Her brother who survives is E. H. Dunham of Grinnell. Mrs. Hannay passed away in a local hospital on October 8, 1945, after a long illness.

The family moved to Grinnell in 1876, when Alice was a little child. She spent most of her life here, graduating from Grinnell college with the class of 1893. After her graduation she taught school in Estherville, Iowa. Also in Burlington, Iowa, and for several years in Grinnell high school. She was married April 21, 1909 to James R. Hannay, who survives her. They made their home on a farm three miles northeast of town, until 1915, when they moved to Grinnell. Besides her husband and brother, she leaves a number of nephews and nieces, and a host of friends to mourn her departure. She was a woman of fine mental attainment and native refinement. She was always interested in the Phi Beta Kappa society. For more than 50 years she was a consistent and faithful member of the First Congregational church of Grinnell, where she was seen in her pew every Sunday so long as her health permitted. She was also an active member of the Historical and Literary club in which she took much pride and pleasure.
