Ross Mintle, 93, of Grinnell died on Saturday, Nov. 4, 2006, at St. Francis Manor in Grinnell.



He was born July 12, 1913, on the family farm near Grinnell where he was raised and attended rural school, graduating from Grinnell High School with the Class of 1931.
