Teaching them about life and Christ was her passion. In 2005, Eric and Amy received a joint calling to begin a retreat center - a Sanctuary for rest and refuge in the Lord. This vision continues today.

Through the years, Amy developed a gift for interior design and loved dreaming up the next dental office or home project with Eric. There was never a person who Amy wouldn't honor. Everyone was comfortable around her. Perfect strangers would reveal things to her that most people would never learn. Amy would carry all of these gifts with her anywhere she went. She was known for her servanthood and kindness.

Behind a mild exterior was the heart and grit of a warrior with the faith of an angel and the courage of a lion. On Wednesday, Dec. 25, she finally succumbed to a battle her flesh couldn't win. Never complaining, her body gave way to a brain tumor that was determined to take her life.

Amy was a leader, nurturer, Academy. She enjoyed spending prayer warrior, idealist, dreamer, encourager, and most amazinglymuch to her husband's chagrinnever in a hurry. She always had time for you.
