David Agnew, Sr., was born in County Down, Ireland, May 10, 1850, and departed this life March 1, 1916, at the age of 65 years, 9 months, and 21 days. He came to this country in 1868, locating in Duchess county, N. Y., and was united in marriage with Sarah Patterson in 1874. To this union were born eight children, David Jr., Robert, and Mrs. Emma Cleland, of Ewart, Ia.; Alfred, Frank, Minnie, and Paul, of Montezuma, Ia.; Mrs. Susan Bridges of Canada preceding both father and mother to the Great Beyond, July 9, 1909.
