Mrs. Anne Akers Succumbs To Long Illness Wednesday

Mrs. Warren N. (Anne) Akers, 36, 833 East Street, died about noon Wednesday following an illness of the past several years.

Prayer services were held that afternoon from Smith Funeral Home. Memorial services will be held later in the Abbey Mausoleum in Washington, D.C., and her ashes will be placed there beside those of her husband.

She was the daughter of Howel and Elizabeth Hays Jones and was born Sept. 25th, 1873, in Topeka, Kan. She lived for many years in Washington, D.C., where her husband was an official of the Corporation Trust Co. As a young girl, she studied at the Art Institute in Chicago and later gained recognition as a painter and poet.
