## A VERY SAD DEATH.

Mrs. Fannie L. Alvord, Wife of Dr. A. W. Alvord, Succumbs to a Paralytic Stroke Suffered Two Months

Ago.

The many friends and acquaintances of Mrs Fannie L. Alvord, wife of Dr. A. W. Alvord, 55 Eremont St., have been deeply grieved, to learn of herd-ath; which occurred last evening at 70 clock. Mrs. Alvord suffered a very serious stroke of paralysis, August 27th, and, from that time, gradually failed in nealth, death resulting. Surviving her in addition to her husband, are a daughter, Mico Louise, and a son, Max, aged 11 years.

Mrs. Alvord was born Sept 10, 1853, at Kewanee, Ill., and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. G Little, prominent and respected residents of that city. Her early education was acquired at Kewanee, and in 1867, the family moved to Grinnell, Iowa. Mrs. Alvord graduated with honor from the high school of that city, and later, was graduated from Iowa College at Grinnell. She was possessed of an exceptionally fine contralto voice, and was a favorite in musical and social cirles. In the year 1878, and in the month of January, she was united in marrige to Dr. Austin W. Alvord, the ceremony taking place at her home. In 1882, Dr. and Mrs. Alvord moved to this city and have resided here continuously since. Her attainments in both literary and musical lines made her recognized as one of Battle Creek's most able women. For years she sang and presided as organist in the First Presbyterian church. She was a valued memper of that church, and was ever willing to lend her aid where needed. One of the characteristics of her life was the love of music, and her voice was often heard by those who were suffering, and needed song to cheer them.

Mrs. Alvord was one of the number comprising the original Nichols hospital board, and for years was secretary of the same, discharging her duties with acceptability to all. Mrs. Alvord was a member of the Amateur Musical Club of the city, and was one of its foremost vocalist. Her interests in literary work were also identified with the Woman's Club of this city. In the loss of Mrs. Alvord Battle Creek is deprived of a woman of character, of great worth, of marked ability. The sorrowing family has the sincere symathy of the entire city.

The funeral services will be held at the family residence tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, to which friends are invited. Rev. William S. Potter, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will officiate. The internment which will be private, will be at Oakhill.
