Helpful Life Reaches Close

Mrs. Andrew Appleby is Called Suddenly From Activities of This Life.

FUNERAL SERVICES WERE
HELD TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

A great shock came to the many friends of Mrs. Andrew Appleby when it became known she had passed away.

On Sunday morning, May 27, in company with a number of friends she went to the Malcom Cemetery to decorate the graves of members of their family. She was apparently in her usual good health. While bending over the grave of her mother in the act of planting a flower she was suddenly stricken down and lay unconscious. Friends gathered about her and medical aid was summoned. Later that evening she passed away.

From the home near Kellogg the family moved to Sheridan Township and for a time lived in Chester Township. July 26, 1890, she was united in marriage to Andrew Appleby. To them were born seven children: Austin of Grinnell; Ida of Kansas City, Mrs. Tom Logan; Lucile of Fargo, N. D., Mrs. Fred Foster; Lillian of Grinnell, Mrs. Floyd Pugh; Clara of Atlantic, Ia., Mrs. Max Lash; Gladys of Grinnell, Mrs. Carl Jones; Clinton of Grinnell.

All are married except Clinton, who lives at home.

Mrs. Appleby was reared under the influence of the Lutheran church and was confirmed in the Lutheran Church. She was a firm believer in the teachings of the word and the saving power of the Christ. She leaves to mourn her passing her husband, her seven children, ten grand children and her five brothers, all of whom were present at the funeral services.
