William Short Ashby, son of Thomas and Ann Ashby was born in Mercer County. Ill.. Oct. 30, 1855, and passed away at his home in Chicago, Ill., about 11 o'clock Sunday evening, Nov. 17, 1929, aged 74 years and 18 days.
