In recent months he had become particularly earnest in religious matters and all will testify to the sincerlty and energy of his effort to lead the Christian life.

He was a member of the Veeman and of the Woodmen of the World Many friends will mourn his passing He is survived by his brother. Fred Beeler, his sister, Mrs. Mary Cafrett, his wife and four, daughters, Mrs. Nancy May Beason, Mrs. Ruth McDowell, Mrs. Mabel McDowell and Mrs. Addle Peters, and by ten grand-children.
