While visiting with her daughter, Mrs. C. Vanderveer, she became critically ill, and about one week ago she was removed to the home of Mrs. Charles Evans. Realizing that the end was near. she wished to spend her last days in the home that had been hers for almost forty years.

It was here, surrounded by loved ones and her faithful daughters, that she slipped away.

Her early girlhood was spent in the neighborhood of her birth.

On August 16, 1870, she was united in marriage to Albert Berriman. To this union were born four children, three daughters and one son, namely Mrs. Milton Buckwalter, Mrs. C. Vanderveer and Mrs. Charles Evans and Ira Berri. man.
