Truly it were worth a lifetime of Christian effort, to so calmly, so peacefully, and trustfully meet death.

Those who have known Mrs. Black will always remember her cheerful, attractive manner and will associate her life with a real sweetness of disposition which made her a joy and a cheer wherever she was.
